Join us for a discussion focused on the ethical and legal ramifications of a unique example of the application of the Native American Graves Protection and Repatriation Act (NAGPRA). Native American human remains were stolen from a National Park Service (NPS) museum collection and recovered many years later. The thief was found guilty of theft of government property, fined, forced to make public and written acknowledgements of his actions, and given time in jail. The NPS completed consultations with multiple Native Nations and, nearly thirty years after the theft, the remains were repatriated and reburied.
